


Heart4Schools Interactive Map

Our desire is to connect every school in SC with a church that loves and serves them well.




We presently have 483 schools with partnerships and 729 to go! Let pastors in your community know of the opportunities we have to be the hands and feet of Jesus in our local schools.

Closed Doors


Sometimes it seems like the doors to school ministry are closed. You have made call after



What can you do? Pray for the administrator. Be patient. Don't give up. One of our administrators suggested dropping off a personal note asking, "How can I help?" along with a box of donuts, flowers, or a small treat. We have seen this work!

Remember that it takes time to build trust. As we begin our partnerships may we under promise and over deliver. Let's be faithful in what is asked and continue to show up consistently (how about weekly) to ask how you can pray for them - and how you can help.

Find ways to be present in the schools and get to know the administration, teachers, staff, and students. As they experience your love for them, doors for ministry will open throughout the year.





Reading Buddies

Most schools have opened their doors for volunteers to return. South Carolina Baptist church members around the state are reading with students for 30 minutes a week. They are connecting with the student, supporting and encouraging their reading, and letting them know that they are cared for and special! Do you have Reading Buddies at your local elementary school?

What is Your "Why"?

In ten gospel passages, we read of Jesus' compassion. Mark 6:34 says, "When he went ashore he saw a great crowd, and he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd". Chuck Bomar, author of <u>Serving Local Schools: Bring Christ's Compassion to the Core of Your Community,</u> says as image bearers of Jesus, we are to reflect His compassion and love. We intentionally love others because He first loved us.

Unfortunately, we have a tendency to only see the needs right around us. When we go to our local schools, however, we see a "world of diversity right within their walls because the schools draw from multiple neighborhoods" (page 24). Schools are a hub in our communities where all neighborhoods, cultures, and differing socio-economic groups come together. We see:

- Children in foster care
- Homeless students and families
- Families living in poverty
- Students struggling academically and/or socially
- As we talk with administrators, we can learn what they identify as the most pressing needs in the school. By listening, responding, and serving consistently, we show that we really care! In the process, we build trust and create relationships with administrators, faculty, and staff.
- Children and teenagers with parents who are physically or emotionally absent
- Teachers and staff who are burdened with the needs in front of them

As a result, often staff will reach out to pastors, leaders, and volunteers to share their struggles and ask for prayer. Pastors become the unofficial "chaplains" of the school when they have been consistently present and shown compassion throughout the year. They are called on when a student is struggling, someone in the school is seriously ill, when there is an unexpected death, a house fire, or a tragic suicide. Because of the trust that has been built, pastors are able to be "ambassadors for Christ" and share hope during these difficult times. Our communities also begin to see our churches as loving, giving, and supportive. This opens many doors for ministry and life transformation.

Let's start 2023 by connecting with our principals and asking, "How can I help?"



Ministry Spotlight: Lucas Avenue Baptist Church Laurens, SC

Although Lucas Avenue Baptist Church has provided Good News Clubs for eight years at Ford Elementary, they really believe their true partnership with the school began last year when they began serving as Reading Buddies. Patsy Taylor attended the 2021 Heart4Schools Training with her pastor Michael Post. She heard about the opportunity to make a difference in the lives of students — and teachers — through the Reading Buddy program and approached the school in September of 2021. In March of 2022, ten volunteers began serving ten students.

It took time to establish this new program at the school, and finding volunteers proved to be difficult. Patsy's message to each of us is, "Don't give up. Stay in there because if it is God's plan, the doors will open." Before a church service one Sunday morning, she decided to give this ministry to God and asked Him to provide the volunteers. After the service, two people approached her to say they wanted to serve! Some of their church members have also recruited their friends to help. Patsy's husband, Chip wanted to be involved from the beginning. Patsy says the students are craving male attention and love "Mr. Chip". She encourages other churches to be sure to recruit male volunteers.





In the few months the volunteers were in the school last spring, they made a great impact! They provided several duty-free lunches for the teachers as well as hosted breakfast several times in the breakroom with coffee and homemade breads: banana, pumpkin, and apple cinnamon. Each time, they served the teachers and spent time developing relationships and learning more about the teachers — and better understanding their needs. One of the teachers told them, "The whole spirit of the school has changed since you've been coming." Patsy says the school began to "see us as a church that cared."

Volunteers helped with the school's book fair and realized that most of the children did not have enough money to purchase books. They decided to host their own fair at the end of the year. They collected 800 books for 413 students. Books were organized in the cafeteria and each student was able to choose two books to take home for the summer.

At the end of the school year, one of the teachers said, "You have accomplished so much in a short time. I can't wait to see what happens next year!" This year, they are continuing to serve and encourage teachers, and they have 12 volunteers serving 23 students! Patsy says, "I just get excited! I believe this is our mission, what God wants us to do!"

Ministry Spotlight: Riverbluff Church Charleston, SC

Be a Teacher's P.F.T.!

Are you looking for a great way to connect your church family with your school partner? Invite them to become a "Teacher's P.E.T."!

Riverbluff Church encourages our members to get involved in our school partnership with Oakbrook Elementary in a variety of ways. Many cannot participate in Reading Buddies or other activities, but everyone can be a Teacher's P.E.T.!

A Teacher's P.E.T. commits to do 3 things for a teacher or staff member at their school:

- PRAY regularly for that person.
- ENCOURAGE them with at least one monthly note or card of encouragement.
- TREAT them once a month. Treats might include a piece of candy, a fun pack of postit notes, a colored pen, a bookmark, or other small token attached to the encouragement card.

Begin by asking for a list of everyone who works at your school. If your school has a large faculty and staff, you might consider organizing them into groups (Administration, 5th grade teachers, etc.) to make it easier for your church (and for you) to manage.





We provide cards for each group with the names of the teachers or staff members and several prayer points. Teacher's P.E.T.'s take a card to help them remember to pray and write their notes. Church members bring their notes and treats to the church on the last Sunday of each month and place them in the "Bless OES" mailbox for me to deliver to the school on Monday.

We have seen small groups, ministry groups, Bible Study classes, and individuals commit to different groups of faculty and staff. Not only is every faculty and staff member of our school being covered in prayer, but our church family is also growing closer as they pray and serve our wonderful school partners together.

Many of the folks at Oakbrook Elementary have stopped me in the hall of the school to tell me how they have taped their encouragement notes on their computers or desks so that they can look at them whenever they are feeling overwhelmed or are having a bad day. Many of our school partners have formed friendships with their prayer partners (Teacher's P.E.T.s) and reach out to them when they need personal prayer or to ask for prayer for specific students and families. I take every opportunity to remind them that we care about them and that they are being prayed for. It has been a fun and easy way to be a huge blessing to our school partners in JESUS' Name!

6,000+ Hungry Students

Do you have students attending your local schools who go hungry in the evenings and on the weekends? The answer is probably a resounding, "YES"! JoAnn Johnson, Faith-Based Giving Manager at Harvest Hope Food Bank recently reported a total of 6,000 students in the 20 counties served by Harvest Hope who still need backpacks of food for the weekend. This doesn't reflect the remaining 26 counties in South Carolina.

With rising inflation, we are hearing of families who are living in desperation. They don't know how they will take care of their families. Rising costs are making it impossible to pay for basic household expenses.

Consider talking with your guidance counselor and/or social worker and ask if they have students they are worried about. Ask how you can help. This may mean creating and stocking a food pantry for the school, providing boxes of food for families, or giving weekly bags of food for students to take home on the weekend.

District social workers have expressed a need for gas gift cards (so parents can get to work) or grocery gift cards. These social workers often give out of their own pockets to provide for their students.


